round about 5" long, from Arizona. Value for such a specimen is in the neighborhood of \$3000.00. It was a very nice piece.



October Birthstone



October also has two birthstones; **Tourmaline** and **Opal**. **Tourmaline** is a favorite gemstone for many because it's available in a rainbow of beautiful colors. **Opal** gemstones are truly unique because each individual gem is adorned with a one-of-a-kind color combination.

The name opal derives from the Greek Opallos, meaning "to see a change of color." Opals range in color from milky white to black with flashes of yellow, orange, green, red, and blue. An opal's beauty is the product of contrast between its color play and its background. Opal is a formation of non-crystalline silica gel that seeped into crevices in the sedimentary strata. Through time and nature's heating and molding processes, the gel hardened into the form of opals. The opal is composed of particles closely packed in spherical arrangements. When packed together in a regular pattern, a three-dimensional array of spaces is created that give opal its radiance.




Vanuatu volcano erupts; 11,000 prepare to evacuate

October 1, 2017, Fox News Radio New Zealand A flotilla of boats was headed to the Pacific island of Ambae, Vanuatu, on Sunday as efforts got underway to evacuate all 11,000 residents because of an erupting volcano. Globs of lava were seen flying as far as 300 feet every few seconds, vulcanologist Brad Scott told Radio New Zealand. The eruption has polluted water sources on the island, leaving thousands in need of safe drinking water, Red Cross delegate Joe Cropp told Reuters. While some islanders have flown out, thousands of



others have gone to emergency shelters as they prepare for the total evacuation. The Manaro Voui volcano began rumbling in September and volcanoes on the Vanuatu islands of Ambrym and Lopevi are also active.



Diamonds may be 'forever' but some may have formed more recently than geologists thought. A study of 26 diamonds, formed under extreme melting conditions in the Earth's mantle, found two populations, one of which has geologically 'young' ages. The results show that certain volcanic events on Earth may still be able to create super-heated conditions previously thought to have only existed early in the planet's history before it cooled. The findings may have implications for diamond prospecting.


Geologist finds new Bitterroot fault line

A mapping method used to look at floodplains in the Bitterroot Valley turned up something unexpected: a new fault line that just might cross under the Lake Como Dam. Jeff Lonn, a geologist with the Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology in Butte, said Ravalli County was using Light Detection and Ranging — or LIDAR — equipment as part of a floodplain study. LIDAR uses laser to map the ground, showing what the land is like devoid of homes, grasses and trees. With tall grasses covering a landscape that's dotted with trees, it's easy for the untrained eye to miss the scarp. But a closer look shows where an earthquake offset the surface of the earth, dipping the east side down and pushing the west side up. In other areas, the scarp is closer to a couple hundred feet.



New Mineral Discovered: Nataliyamalikite

An international team of geologists led by Monash University Professor Joël Brugger has discovered a new thallium mineral — nataliyamalikite. "It contains thallium, a rare heavy metal most famous for its qualities as a poison," said Prof. Brugger, lead author of a paper published in the journal American Mineralogist. The new mineral was discovered in the Kamchatka Peninsula — one of the long-lived volcanically active areas on Earth, with activity dating back to the Late Triassic epoch. It occurs as pseudo-cubic

nanocrystals at Kamchatka's Avacha volcano, in association with active high temperature (up to 1,148-1,184 degrees Fahrenheit, or 620-640 degrees Celsius) fumarolic vents. "The discovery of this new mineral means we will be able to better understand how metals are extracted from deep-seated sources within our planet, and concentrated at shallow levels to form economic ore deposits," Prof. Brugger said. "This will give us a unique insight into the processes responsible for the geochemical evolution of our planet."



Astronomers discover a pitch-black planet that reflects almost zero sunlight

When you imagine planets outside of our solar system you might dream up ocean worlds, thick plains of ice, or boiling seas of molten rock. Worlds like those certainly do exist out there somewhere, but the exoplanet known as WASP-12b most definitely doesn't fall into any of those categories. A new research effort to study the planet hasn't exactly revealed what it's made of, but it has discovered that the planet is the blackest of blacks, and reflects so little sunlight that not even freshly-laid asphalt can compare.
