
### Why on Earth Would We Care About Earthquakes in Mesa County???


Well, for one thing, they tell us where to look for cool rocks like malachite, azurite, and fluorite crystals! They also tell us where to safely put fluids injection wells, hazardous waste disposal facilities, bridges, and oil and gas infrastructure.

We tend to think of California when we think of earthquakes in the US, but the biggest earthquake in America in historical times was a series in the middle of Missouri in 1811-1812. Magnitudes were huge - 7.5-8.0 and hundreds of people died – at a time when there were very few people even living there! And recently, Oklahoma and Texas especially, have realized that the amount of oil and gas well fluids being injected underground has triggered hundreds of earthquakes, some of which have damaged buildings and property.

So how do we detect small earthquakes, so we know where to be cautious about bigger ones? Geologists use seismometers, which show quakes like this one this April south of Delta, a magnitude 3.2 quake felt by quite a few people. Colorado Mesa University geologists are able to look at signals from several detectors to pinpoint the intensity and location of quakes. CMU retired adjunct professor Dave Wolny analyzes signals from stations like this one southeast of De Beque. (He has spoken to the rock club in the past!)



Then scientists like Dr. Verner Johnson of CMU can place it on a map that also shows all the faults in the area. (Unpublished structure map prepared by Dr. Richard Livaccari):



There is a huge network of faults in the area. They are very interesting to rockhounds! At the top of the map is the area of the Mica Mine, where people find nice tourmaline crystals, as well as nice feldspar and quartz. This area is also full of old copper mines and fluorite, and amethyst outcrops. Faults provide channels for fluids full of minerals to accumulate, so they are places to be on the lookout for azurite, malachite, amethyst, and all kinds of other nice minerals. ## **Board Meeting Minutes, April 9, 2025**

Meeting called to order at 6:12 pm

Board members present: President-Steve, Past president Jeff, Vice President-JoAnn, Board members Scott, Bruce, Bill, Treasurer- June, Secretary-Kimberly

Members present: Pam, Mark

**Previous Board meeting, March 12, 2025, meeting notes discussed:** Review of Mike Daniels' addition to the minutes. Notes, with additions, were displayed on the screen and read out loud. The Board agreed that the names of members should not be listed in the notes as to who voted as an absentee member.

Bill made a motion not to accept the changes that Michael added to the Board meeting on March 12, 2025. Scott seconded the motion. Board approved

The only addition approved by the board members to be added is the line: "The 2024 Compliance Report has been completed and will be distributed to the members and interested parties."

**Revisions to the Blue Book/GJGMC operations manual and guide.** Michael Daniels had suggestions for Blue Book changes (see additions at the end of the notes). Discussion ensued, and board members agreed that the Blue Book needed updating. Bill would like to table the discussion and asked that instead of only making three changes as Mike requested, we go through the entire book and make changes as needed. JoAnn suggested forming a committee of two or three members to go through the bylaws, line by line, and make suggestions. Those suggestions will be presented to the club, which can then vote for which they like.

Michael asked that Steve present the changes and make a motion to vote on the changes at the general meeting on April 10<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The board agreed to respect the motion that Michael requested and tell members about the changes at the meeting. All three policy changes will be discussed, with two changes open to being voted on.

Board members agree that there is discourse in the meetings. One thing that everyone concurred, was that members should not be sent information from individuals, and an individual cannot post something in the clubhouse or send an email/text without notifying the board about the content.

JoAnn makes a motion that the three people, JoAnn, Bill, and Pam, review the blue book as a new committee. Scott seconds and board passes.

No changes can be made to the blue book unless the members vote on it.

*Scholarships* (Blue Book scholarships page 23), Steve asked if we could give the scholarship money for Geology and/or Earth Science students to the CMU foundation. The foundation would conduct the interviews and then choose 5 or more students for scholarships. This gives the foundation some flexibility in choosing candidates. Pam has been the scholarship chairperson for

much of its inception. Bruce makes a motion that for the year of 2025, the 2024 monies will be given to the foundation.

Scott seconds. Bill abstains from voting, but other board members agree.

Pam would still like to be involved with the interviewing of the students.

*Lapidary shop and future jewelry studio.* Bill sent out Site plan reviews/proposals for the two layouts of the jewelry studios.

While getting the building permit for the lapidary shop, it was confirmed that we do not need to have a bathroom in the jewelry studio, that the lapidary shop and clubhouse bathrooms will be enough.

Bill should have a site plan review available by next week. That process for reviewing the application will take three to four weeks and will include an internal agency review. The Building Department review can be concurrent with the Planning Department review. The entire Mesa County review process should take an estimated three to four months. Bill imagines it should be a simple progression, but he cannot make any promises to such.

Bill has shown that there should not be any water impact from the jewelry studio on residential neighbors

Bruce has a time-line spreadsheet: replacing the lapidary shop furnace; (one mini split will take care of the evaporative cooler and the heating); Skid steer rental to level the ground; seal the roof; cover insulation inside of the lapidary shop. The committee is hoping for a November opening date for the studio.

*Moving the south shed*, Volunteers are needed to empty the shed, move the building, and then reload everything. The sign-up sheet for volunteers will be passed around at the April 10th meeting. Bruce would prefer to have 4-5 volunteers.

**Rentals,** the Colorado Native Plant Society is enjoying the rental of the building. The rental agreement will be month-to-month. Motion made by Steve that the rental agreement goes month to month, Jeff seconded, and the board approved

Tech Soup is the renewal for Zoom. June will place the order for the GJGMC. Steve and JoAnn have previously set up the renewal.

Melissa is setting up gold membership cards for lifetime membership.

Craft Show April 12, 2025. Tables will be rearranged per Grete's specifications after the April 10 meeting for the April 12 Craft Show. Kimber will contact WKFM radio to tell them about the show. Dave Berry 12-1 radio show

*September Rock Show:* Flyers state that the GJGMC is hosting the RMFMS convention during the show's dates

*Newsletter editor*. May is the last newsletter that Susan will be putting out. She is requesting that someone take her place and will help them get started.

*Finances*: June will post the finance report on the board

Haining Home Services is billing the GJGMC for a quote on the plumbing for the lapidary shop. They came out, assessed the plumbing that was needed to update the shop for county compliance, and sent a bill for \$212.00 (187.00 looking at the plumbing and 25.00 for driving out). Bruce told them they were not getting paid for an estimate to do work. The company sent a bill to June at the PO Box. Board members agreed they should not be paid for an estimate.

*Meeting room updates*: We do not need to replace the panic bar if people do not lock it too tightly. JoAnn was able to get the meeting room doors and lapidary shop door rekeyed, in addition to 17 keys made for \$180. JoAnn will distribute the keys to the instructors. In the shop, there is a key for the clubhouse. Instructors may open the clubhouse if someone would like a soda or needs to use the additional bathroom

A new rolling mill is needed. The current machine is over 30 years old and is not embossing metal properly. A new one is over \$1,000. JoAnn has only used a few hundred dollars of her \$3,000 shop budget. She will do comparison shopping and show the board different mills.

Bruce and Kimber will bring a donation box for the new jewelry studio.

Meeting adjourned 7:50 pm.
